

EVOLUTION

The Former Baroda State Government created on the 17th December 1948 a Women's Education Trust Fund to establish a Home Science College in Baroda. The Trustees handed over this Educational Fund to the newly established Maharaja Sayajirao University for constructing a building for the Faculty of Home Science.

The University started a Nursery School Chetan Balwadi in June 1949 and on 3rd July, 1950 established the Faculty of Home Science. Evolving from its humble beginnings, the faculty has made conscious efforts towards redefining and broadening its view in response to the rapidly changing national and global scenario. There has been introduction of several new courses, modification of the syllabus and curriculum as per the changing demands of the society and industry.

Rechristened as the 'Faculty of Family and Community Sciences' at the turn of the millennium, it has today evolved into a premier institute encompassing dynamic fields of studies offering various programmes at the undergraduate (Honors) and postgraduate levels along with various certificate courses, PG Diplomas and a doctoral degree.

Some of the defining features of the Faculty of Family and Community Sciences are its professional culture, vibrant teaching learning ethos, engagement with issues of social relevance, teamwork and intrinsic motivation to excel.

Students are encouraged to become effective resourceful and forward thinking professionals in different fields. 

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR ADMISSION INTO UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAM (REGULAR) OF FFCSc.

The applicant should have passed Std. 12th (H.S.C.) - Science/ General Stream or equivalent Examination from a recognized board with ENGLISH as one of the subjects. If the applicant has passed XII Examination without English as a subject but through English as a medium of instruction in school, a certificate from the school needs to be attached stating particulars about medium of instruction.

Applicants from states other than Gujarat and foreign nationals must also apply through this facility.

IMPORTANT NOTE

Personal Aadhaar card number, Email-ID and Mobile number are must for registering the application for Admission in any of the programmes of The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda. The applicants are supposed to be present in person at the Faculty of Family and Community Sciences as per the admission schedule with the print out of the online registration form, relevant documents in original, one set of its self-attested photocopies and two passport size photographs for Admissions. Thalassemia screening programme is compulsory for each admitted student of The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda. The Thalassemia screening programme may be done at the University Health Centre or University Pavilion at a discounted fees of rupees 150/- per student towards the cost of sample testing by "Red Cross Society", India. Students have to produce a Thalassemia screening certificate for obtaining the final eligibility.



- Extension and Communication
- Family and Community Resource Management
- Food and Nutrition
- Human Development and Family Studies

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR ADMISSION TO Ph.D. PROGRAMME

- 1.Candidates for admission to the Ph.D. Programme shall have a Master's degree or a professional degree declared equivalent to the Master's degree by the corresponding statutory regulatory body, with at least 55% marks in aggregate without including the grace mark procedures or its equivalent grade 'B' in the UGC 7-point scale (or an equivalent grade in a point scale wherever grading system is followed) or an equivalent degree from a foreign educational Institution accredited by an Assessment and Accreditation Agency which is approved, recognized or authorized by an authority, established or incorporated under a law in its home country or any other statutory authority in that country for the purpose of assessing, accrediting or assuring quality and standards of educational institutions.
- 2 A relaxation of 5% of marks, from 55% to 50%, or an equivalent relaxation of grade, may be allowed for those belonging to SC/ST/SEBC (Non-creamy layer)/Differently-abled and other categories of candidates as per the decision of the Government of Gujarat and other Statutory bodies, as applicable, from time- to-time, or for those who had obtained their Master's degree prior to 19th September, 1991. The eligibility marks of 55% (or an equivalent grade in a point scale wherever grading system is followed) and the relaxation of 5% to the categories mentioned above are permissible based only on the qualifying marks without including the grace mark procedures.
- 3. Provided further that, if in spite of the above relaxation, the seats allotted for SC/ST/SEBC (Non-Creamy layer)/Differently-abled categories remain unfilled, a Special Admission Drive shall have to be launched, for that particular category within one month from the date of closure of admissions of General Category. It shall have to be ensured that most of the seats under these categories are filled.

- 5. The course-work shall be treated as a prerequisite for the award of Ph.D. degree. All research scholars admitted to the Ph.D. Programme shall be required to complete the course-work prescribed by the University/Faculty/Department during the initial one or two semesters.
- 6. A research scholar having completed the Pre-Ph.D. course-work from another university and moving to The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda, shall be exempted from the coursework. The credits so obtained shall be treated at par with the credits of this University.
- 7. However, such a research scholar will have to appear in the University Entrance Examination (PET) as applicable to Fresh Candidates directly registering for Ph.D. Candidates already holding M. Phil. degree and admitted to the Ph.D. Programme, or those who have already completed the course-work in M.Phil. and have been permitted to proceed to the Ph.D. Programme (including integrated Ph.D. Programme, if any), may be exempted by the Faculty-level Research Advisory Committee (FLRAC)/Institute Level Research Advisory Committee (ILRAC) from the Ph.D. course-work.
- 8. The Ph.D. scholar has to obtain a minimum of 55% of marks in the prescribed Grade Point Scale (or an equivalent grade/CGPA in a point scale wherever grading system is followed) and Structure of the University in the course-work in order to become eligible to continue in the respective Programme and submit the dissertation/thesis, as the case may be.

DEPARTMENT OF CLOTHING AND TEXTILES

The Department of Clothing and Textiles came into inception in 1957 with its Undergraduate Programme B.Sc. (Home) in Clothing and Textiles. B.Sc. (Home) in Fashion Designing was started in 2003. The Postgraduate Programme M.Sc. (Home) came into being in 1962 and Ph.D. in 1969.

The Department of Clothing and Textiles ever since its inception in 1957 has aimed to equip students with necessary proficiencies for a wide variety of careers by integrating theoretical and practical instructional methods. It is sensitive to the growing needs of institutes of higher education and industry, wherein there is a demand for professionals. Thus, the curriculum is being modified from time to time to keep pace with changing times and technology. CAREER OPPORTUNITIES


The curriculum prepares the students for professions as well as vocation. Students are exposed to a large expanse of subjects which help them to choose from a wide variety of avenues for jobs. Over and above in academics, students get the opportunity to work as Textile and Apparel Designer in both Craft Sector as well as Industries (Domestic and Export). The skills acquired during the course, prepares them to be entrepreneurs. Other avenues are as Research Scientist, Extension Worker at NGOs and Training

Centers, Merchandiser etc. The exposure to different sectors of the clothing and textile industry helps the student to take up jobs ranging from designer to managerial level in different units of cottage industries and high level technical industries.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR B.Sc.(HONORS) IN CLOTHING AND TEXTILES / FASHION DESIGNING PROGRAMME

The courses in the first year of the B.Sc. (Honors) regular programme are common for all the five streams of the Faculty of Family and Community Sciences namely Clothing and Textiles, Extension and Communication, Family and Community Resource Management, Foods and Nutrition and Human Development and Family Studies and GLP. At the second year level choice and merit based selection on availability of seats are made for all the streams of the FFCSc, including two specializations of department namely

- i. Clothing and Textiles
- ii. Fashion Designing.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR M.Sc. (F.C.Sc.) IN CLOTHING AND TEXTILES PROGRAMME

The candidate holding a Bachelor's degree in any of the following disciplines from The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda or any other recognized university or recognized institution, shall be considered eligible for admission to M.Sc. (F.C.Sc.)Clothing and Textiles.

- B.Sc./BA with specialization in Clothing and Textile / Fashion Designing /Fashion Technology
- B.Sc. /B.A. Composite with Clothing and Textile as a subject.
- B. (Tech) with specialization in Textile Chemistry/Textile Technology.

Students seeking admission should possess a minimum of 55% marks at the last qualifying exam. The eligible candidates would be given admission based on a written test and personal interview which would be conducted by the departmental admission committee.

Students who have not done the following courses at the undergraduate level, would be required to complete those additional courses along with the 72 credits of the Master's programme of the department as the pre-requisites:

- Fabric Manufacture and Design
- Dyeing and Printing of Textiles
- Textile Science
- Textile Testing
- Draping

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR Ph.D. IN CLOTHING AND TEXTILES PROGRAMME

Candidates having any of the following Post Graduate Degrees are eligible for Ph.D. Programme.

- M.Sc. (Home/ Family and Community Sciences) Clothing and Textile/ Apparel/Fashion Designing
- Master degree in Textile Chemistry
- Master degree in Textile Technology
- Master degree in Art History
- Master degree in Anthropology
- Master degree in Applied Arts/ Design/ Fine Arts
- Master degree in Museology

The requirement regarding eligibility for (1) securing admission (2) examination (3) submission of dissertation/ Ph.D. Programme offered by the Department would be governed by the ordinances as per new UGC norms.

However, for Ph.D. admission, besides the above degree, the candidate should have cleared either of the following examination:

- PET Exam, conducted by The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda.
- UGC JRF/NET/GUJSLET/Govt. in related subjects.

However, the final registration for Ph.D. will be after clearing a personal interview/submission of a concept note to the duly constituted Department Research Committee in consultation with the available guide of the department.



ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR B.Sc. (F.C.Sc.) (HONORS) IN EXTENSION AND COMMUNICATION PROGRAMME

The courses in the first year of the B.Sc. (Honors) regular programmes are common for all the five streams of the Faculty of Family and Community Sciences namely Clothing and Textiles, Extension and Communication, Family and Community Resource Management, Foods and Nutrition and Human Development and Family Studies. At the second year level choice and merit based selection on availability of the seats are made for all the streams of the Faculty of Family and Community Sciences.



The programmes offered at various levels have three basic components: Academics, Research and Extension. The Department offers Academic Programmes like B.Sc, M.Sc and Ph.D, Degree. The two areas of specialization 'Hospitality Management' and 'Interior Design' are offered at U.G. Level and 'Hospitality and Resource Management' and 'Interior Design' at P.G. Level. The Department had received National recognition from Government of India and was awarded the 'Technical Back-up Support Unit' under the Ministry of Non-Renewable Energy Sources from the Academic Year 1986 to 2001.

The Department being an interdisciplinary field integrates theories and principles from Basic Sciences, Environmental Studies, Human Engineering, Architecture, Civil Engineering, Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences. The Department aims at empowering the students through providing knowledge and skill enhancement in various discipline with the use of management of Personal, Family and Community Resources so that the professional competency among the students is developed for undertaking jobs in Private and Public Sector Industries or to take up Entrepreneurial ventures.

In the context of changing scenarios in all facets of society, the curriculum of Family and Community Resource Management is designed to provide students a holistic perspective of the discipline and get extensive practical exposure. The course also provides Industry Placement during the course of study. The major thrust areas of the programme are 'Interior Design', 'Hospitality Management', 'Travel and Tourism', 'Event Management', 'Ergonomics', 'Residential and Commercial Space Designing', 'Resource Management', 'Consumer Education' and 'Environment'. The curriculum designed for each area of programme is reflected upon and revised/ modified regularly. Thus, new courses are designed to strengthen and upgrade the programme as per the needs of the society so as to widen the scope of job opportunities for the students.

VISION

The Department works with the vision to be a distinguished center that fulfills the needs of Family, Community and Nation for enhancing quality and excellence in teaching, learning process through disseminating congruent education, taking up collaborative projects for strengthening Industry and Institute linkages, strengthening Extension work and Research to serve as a valuable resource for Industry and Community and develop competencies for professional practice in the field.

MISSION

They can become professional Event Managers and Itinerary Planner & Executors. They can also work as Environment Activists. The curriculum of Interior Design enables the students to pursue their independent Professional Practice of Residential & Commercial Spaces or undertake Professional experiences with Architectural/Interior Design Firms/ Landscape Design Firms. The students can also pursue a career as a Colour/ Lighting/ Furniture/ Furnishings/ Kitchen/ Storage/ Ergonomic Consultant and Designer. The students can also opt for vocations as a Project Manager for Interior Projects and a Designer for Events.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR B.Sc. (F.C.Sc.) (HONORS) IN FAMILY AND COMMUNITY RESOURCE MANAGEMENT (HOSPITALITY MANAGEMENT) PROGRAMME:

The courses in the First Year of the B.Sc. (Honors) Regular Programme are common for all the five streams of the Faculty of Family and Community Sciences namely Clothing and Textiles, Extension and Communication, Family and Community Resource Management, Foods and Nutrition and Human Development and Family Studies. At the Second-Year level, choice and merit-based selection are made for all the streams of the Faculty of Family and Community Sciences including two specializations of the Family and Community Resource Management, namely Hospitality Management and Interior Design.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR B.Sc. (F.C.Sc.) HONORS IN FAMILY AND COMMUNITY RESOURCE MANAGEMENT (INTERIOR DESIGN) PROGRAMME:

The courses in the First Year of the B.Sc. (Honors) Regular Programme are common for all the five streams of the Faculty of Family and Community Sciences namely Clothing and Textiles, Extension and Communication, Family and Community Resource Management, Foods and Nutrition and Human Development and Family Studies. At the Second-Year level, choice and merit-based selections are made for all the streams of the Faculty of Family and Community Sciences including two specializations of the Family and Community Resource Management, namely Hospitality Management and Interior Design. In addition to this, clearing an Aptitude test to judge drawing ability, creativity and related skills (conducted by the Department) is essential to become eligible for 'Interior Design Specialization' at the Undergraduate level.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR B.Sc. (F.C.Sc.) HONORS IN INTERIOR DESIGN (HIGHER PAYMENT PROGRAMME):

The educational qualification of the candidate seeking admission in B.Sc. Honors in Interior Design (HPP) should be Minimum 10 + 2 pass with English as a compulsory subject or should have studied through English as a medium of instruction OR Diploma in Architecture/Civil Engineering after 10th (minimum 3-Years duration) from a recognized University. The admissions are open for both male and female candidates who possess the required educational qualifications. The admission will be granted on the basis of merit. The number of the seats for the program is 60. The

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR M.Sc. (F.C.Sc.) IN FAMILY AND COMMUNITY RESOURCE MANAGEMENT (HOSPITALITY AND RESOURCE MANAGEMENT):

The candidate holding a Bachelor's degree in any of the following disciplines from The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda or any other University or recognized Institution, shall be considered eligible for admission to M.Sc. (F.C.Sc.) in Family and Community Resource Management (Hospitality and Resource Management).

• B.Sc. (F. C. Sc.) Honors Degree in FCRM (Hospitality Management), 10+2+3 pattern of Education with 55% or above marks or equivalent grade.

OR

• B.Sc. (F. C. Sc.)(General Level Programme)/ B. A. (Home) Degree with General Home Science, / B.Sc.(Home Science) with 10+2+3 pattern of education with 55% or above marks or equivalent grade.

Admission to M.Sc.F.C.Sc. Degree Program in the Department is on merit, based on the marks/grade obtained at the qualifying entrance examination and interview. There will be an interview and written test for those who meet the minimum requirement of higher second class or an equivalent grade at the qualifying examination on the strength of which admission is sought. However, the candidates selected for admission would be required to clear prerequisite courses prescribed by the department if needed.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR M.Sc. (F.C.Sc.) IN FAMILY AND COMMUNITY RESOURCE MANAGEMENT (INTERIOR DESIGN):

The candidate holding a Bachelor's degree in any of the following disciplines from The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda or any other University or recognized Institution, shall be considered eligible for admission to M.Sc.(F.C.Sc.) in Family and Community Resource Management (Interior Design).

• B.Sc. (F. C. Sc.)Honors Degree in FCRM (Interior Design), 10+2+3 pattern of Education with 55% or above marks or equivalent grade.

OR

• B.Sc. (F. C. Sc.)(General Level Programme) or B. A. (Home) Degree with General Home Science/B.Sc.(Home Science) with 10+2+3 pattern of education with 55% or above marks or equivalent grade.

OR

• B.Sc. (F. C. Sc.)(Honors) Degree with Interior Design Specialization, 10+2+3 pattern of education with 55% or above marks or equivalent grade.

Admission to M.Sc.F.C.Sc. Degree Program in the Department is on merit, based on the marks/grade obtained at the qualifying entrance examination and interviews. There will be an interview and written test for those who meet the minimum requirement of higher second class or an equivalent grade at the qualifying examination on the strength of which admission is sought. Students seeking admission in M.Sc. (F.C.Sc.) Degree Program with specialization in Interior Design will be required to also clear a Drawing Aptitude test, along with the written test and interview. However, the candidates selected for admission would be required to clear prerequisite courses prescribed by the department if needed.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR POST GRADUATE DIPLOMA IN HOTEL INTERIORS (HIGHER PAYMENT PROGRAM):

Admission to Post Graduate Diploma in Hotel Interiors is on merit basis. Any Graduate with 10+2+3 pattern of Education from any discipline from a recognized University is eligible to seek admission to the programme.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR Ph.D. IN FAMILY AND COMMUNITY RESOURCE MANAGEMENT:

The candidates having Post Graduate Degree in FCRM/FRM/HM/Home are eligible for admission for the Ph.D. program in Department of Family and Community Resource Management. However, for the Ph.D. admission besides the above degree the candidates should have cleared either of the following examinations.

- Ph.D.Entrance Test (PET) exam in the subject FCRM/FRM/Home Management conducted periodically by The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda.
- UGC-JRF/NET in the subject FCRM/FRM/Home Management /related subject.
- GUJSET in the subject FCRM/FRM/Home Management /related subject.

Admission for Ph. D will be granted by two-way process through:

- 1. An Entrance Test (PET) shall be the qualifying test with qualifying marks as 50%. The syllabus of the Entrance Test shall consist of 50% of Research Methodology and 50% shall be Subject specific.
- 2. An interview/viva-voce is to be organized by the Department Research Committee. The Candidate is required to discuss their Research proposal/Research interest/area through a presentation before the Department Research Committee.

3. The final registration for Ph.D. will be done on approval by the Faculty Research Advisory Committee as per the recommendations made in the Department Research Committee.

However, after clearing the PET exam in the subject FCRM/FRM//HM/Home Management the candidate shall be required to submit a Ph.D Application form along with research concept note to the duly constituted Department Research Committee and subsequently present the proposal in an open seminar followed by an interview before the committee (O.Ph.D6).

The requirement regarding eligibility for (1) securing admission (2) examination (3) submission of dissertation/thesis of Ph.D. Programme offered by the Department would be governed by the ordinances as per. O.Ph.D. of The M.S.University of Baroda.

Ph.D. IN FAMILY AND COMMUNITY RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

The department offers Doctoral Programme to cater to the professional growth of Faculties already in employment as well as of candidates aspiring to advance their knowledge and develop Higher Academic qualifications to compete for lucrative

positions in public or private enterprises and also to enter the portals of Higher Education as Academicians and /or Researchers. The programme of study comprises a combination of coursework and research leading to Doctoral Degree. The Doctoral Programme has flexibility built-in the framework and is aimed at developing analytical approach, strengthening knowledge base and developing competence to plan and conduct independent research and participate in policy making bodies among the scholars.

The major research areas under which Ph.D. scholar can select their dissertation topics include Family and Community Resources Management, Energy Resource Management and Renewable Improved Energy Technologies for Domestic Applications, Women's Issues and Development, Environmental Studies, Consumer Studies, Housing and Interiors, Household Equipment, Ergonomics, Family and Population Studies, Entrepreneurship and Hospitality Management.

The requirement regarding eligibility for (1) securing admission (2) examination (3) submission of dissertation/thesis of Ph.D. the programme offered by the Department would be governed by the ordinance as per UGC norms.

Financial Assistance: Candidates are advised to apply directly to various national bodies like UGC, ICSSR and ICAR which offer junior research fellowships to doctoral students. The candidates can also apply for the University Research Fellowship awarded by The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda. In addition, the department has projects from time to time, which can also make financial aid available to those who register for Ph.D. on topics related to the project work.

Scheme of Examination: Submission of the dissertation is followed by a viva-voce examination.

COURSE-WORK: CREDIT REQUIREMENTS -Ph.D. PROGRAMME IN FAMILY AND COMMUNITY RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

- The course-work shall be treated as a prerequisite for the award of Ph.D. degree. All
 research scholars admitted to the Ph.D. Programme shall be required to complete the
 course-work prescribed by the University/ Faculty/Department during the initial one
 or two semesters.
- The credits assigned to the Ph.D. course-work shall be a minimum of 08 credits and a maximum of 16 credits.
- Faculty/College/Department/Institute/Center level Four [04] credits shall be assigned to one or more courses on Research Methodology which could cover areas such as Quantitative methods, Computer applications, Research ethics and Review

of published research in the relevant field, training, field work, etc. Others shall be advanced level courses for preparing the research scholar for Ph.D. degree.

DEPARTMENT OF FOODS AND NUTRITION

The Department of Foods and Nutrition was established in the year 1950 and is a premier institute for higher education that offers comprehensive programs at undergraduate, postgraduate and doctoral levels. On the basis of strong research in the areas of public health nutrition, dietetics and food Science, the Department has the distinction of being recognized as a Centre of Excellence by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare as early as in 1984 and as a WHO Collaborating Centre for about two decades in various areas like Anemia Control (1993-2007), Weaning Technology (1995-2003), Maternal and Child Health Nutrition (2008-2012) and Diet Related Non Communicable Diseases (2003-2012). The department was the only academic institute to be recognized as a WHO Collaborating Centre in 1993. Even today, the department has the distinction of being the first amongst Asian countries to offer a degree in public health nutrition at both undergraduate and postgraduate levels.

VISION

To create world class committed public health, dietetics, nutrition and food science professionals who can contribute meaningfully to the social, economic and health development of the country.

MISSION

Persistently update and enrich the curriculum, conduct research in ongoing and emerging areas of nutrition and partner with various stakeholders to improve nutrition outcomes of the Indian population through evidence based advocacy and national program implementation.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

The courses are planned to impart knowledge & skills to work as foods & nutrition/ dietetics/public health/food science & quality control professionals. The courses are designed to promote the understanding of basic science courses with their applications in foods and nutrition in all the three areas offered by the department. Basics of foods and nutrition courses are covered before the specialization specific ones. Courses of different specializations are offered with hands-on clinical, field and industry experience. The courses provide specialized professional training making the students' job ready. Dietetics graduates are trained to work as clinical researchers and as clinical dieticians in hospital settings and as food service managers and counselors in wellness clinics in various settings such as schools, workplaces, industries etc. Public Health Nutrition graduates are trained to work as public health program implementers and managers in government and non-government organizations including United Nations (UNICEF/WFP/GAIN etc.) at both national and international levels. Similarly, Food Science and Quality Control undergraduates are trained to work as food quality control and food product development personnel.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR B.Sc.(F.C.Sc.) (HONORS) FOODS AND NUTRITION PROGRAMME

The courses in the first year of the B.Sc. (F.C.Sc.) (Honors) regular program are common for all the five streams of the Faculty of Family and Community Sciences namely Foods and Nutrition, Human Development and Family Studies, Clothing and Textiles, Extension and Communication and Family and Community Resource Management.

At the second year level choice and merit based selections are made based on availability of seats for all the streams of the Faculty of Family and Community Sciences including the three specializations of the Foods and Nutrition, namely B.Sc.(F.C.Sc.) (Honors) in Dietetics, Public Health Nutrition and Food Science and Quality Control.

Due to the popularity of Foods and Nutrition as a specialization, the department initiated a Higher Payment Program from 2015 onwards wherein students join the

department from the first year itself and study subjects of Foods and Nutrition for all six semesters. In this program, the fundamentals of all the three specializations of Foods and Nutrition are covered. For admission to the B.Sc.(F.C.Sc.) (Honors) Foods and Nutrition (Higher Payment Program), the applicant should have passed H.Sc. or equivalent exam from a recognized board with English as one of the subjects or applicant should have passed SSC with minimum 2 years Diploma Program with English as one of the subjects. Admission is on the basis of merit.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR M.Sc.(F.C.Sc.) FOODS AND NUTRITION PROGRAMME WITH SPECIALIZATION IN PUBLIC HEALTH NUTRITION OR DIETETICS

For admission to M.Sc. (Family and Community Sciences) degree program in Foods and Nutrition, with specialization in Dietetics/Public Health Nutrition a student must have completed—

- (a) B.Sc./ B.F.C.Sc. (Family and Community Sciences/Home) with Foods & Nutrition/ Dietetics / Public Health Nutrition/Food Science & Quality Control.
- **(b)** B.F.C.Sc./ B.Sc. (Vocational) with specialization in Foods Science and Quality Control or Clinical Nutrition and Dietetics.
- (c) Where Foods and Nutrition is not clearly mentioned in the qualifying degree the following criteria should be met for eligibility.
 - Biochemistry along with 01 paper in each of the following areas.
 - (1) PHN/Community Nutrition
- (2) Human Nutrition

(3) Dietetics

- (4) Food Science & Nutrition
- (d) B.F.C.Sc./B.Sc. as in above a b and P.G. Diploma in Dietetics, P G Diploma in Applied Nutrition, P G Diploma in Food Service Management & P G Diploma in Public Health Nutrition from a recognized institution.
- (e) Students graduated from 'Open Universities' recognized by the University Grants Commission.
- (f) Students scoring a minimum of 55% marks in the last qualifying exam i.e. UG / P G Diploma students are eligible to apply for M.Sc. in Foods and Nutrition (Dietetics / PHN) degree program. Relaxation of 5% will be given to SC/ST category.
- (g) The final selection would be based on the following criteria:
 - a) Marks/grades obtained at the qualifying examinations (50%)
 - b) Entrance examination (50%)

Note: The qualifying marks/score for the entrance exam would be $\geq 40\%$.

(h) Merit list will be prepared based on the above mentioned criteria along with GOG roster Guidelines.

To qualify for M. Sc. (Family and Community Sciences) degree with FN-Public Health Nutrition or FN-Dietetics, students must complete a minimum of 51 credits of coursework, 15 credits of dissertation and 6 credits of Internship.

The eligibility marks of 55% (or an equivalent grade in a point scale wherever grading system is followed) and the relaxation of 5% to the candidates from following categories SC/ST/OBC (non-creamy layer)/differently-abled and other categories of candidates as per the decision of the Commission from time to time, or for those who had obtained their Master's degree prior to 19th September, 1991 will be eligible. Program also includes a research component wherein students conduct an in-depth research study in their area of specialization in conjunction with the coursework. This specialization has been designed with a view to enable students to demonstrate advanced knowledge in medical nutrition therapy and foodservice management and to critically evaluate nutrition information based on scientific reasoning for clinical, community, and food service application. Students will also learn to apply patient centered principles and competent nutrition and dietetics evidence-informed practice to ensure positive outcomes for nutrition care of individuals, community groups and populations.

M. Sc. (F.C.Sc.) PUBLIC HEALTH NUTRITION

The Master of Science Program in Public Health Nutrition provides students with the knowledge & skills to practice as public health nutrition professionals & provide trained cadre of nutrition professionals to government, non government (international/national NGOs, training institutes etc.) to contribute in large scale implementation of national flagship health, foods & nutrition programs. The program has an internship component in which the students complete supervised practice hours within community-based settings of various UN organizations like UNICEF, GAIN, International/national NGOs, Training institutes etc. The M.Sc. Program also includes a research component wherein students conduct an in-depth original research or conduct operations research in public health nutrition in conjunction with the coursework. This specialization comprises courses which will enable students to analyze emerging and critical issues in public health nutrition, dietary risks & food systems at local, national and international levels by drawing on currently available evidence-based research. Students will also learn to monitor and analyze available population health, nutrition, dietary & epidemiological data- to assess the effectiveness of public health nutrition policies, interventions, programs and services; and to identify gaps and opportunities in service delivery, policy frameworks and program implementation.

POST GRADUATE DIPLOMA IN APPLIED NUTRITION

This is an intensive program for graduates of Nutrition and Allied Sciences. This course also gives an opportunity to health and allied professionals to learn nutrition. This course is designed to provide exhaustive training in applications of foods & nutrition knowledge & skills in clinical, community and industrial settings. The practical approach and exposure helps the students to become integral part of the nutrition support team in hospitals & health care settings. The 'Indian Dietetics Association' has recognized this program as one of the eligibility criteria for application of the Registered Dietitian (RD) exam. After completing The Post Graduate Diploma in Applied Nutrition students can work as Medical Nutrition Therapists/Nutrition Health Promotion professionals at Hospitals and Clinics, Nutrition consultants at Gyms and Health clubs, Sports Nutrition Consultants at Sports Clubs, Schools, Colleges, Freelance Nutrition Consultants and Entrepreneurs. It has an added advantage of adding one more year of education (12+ 3+1 i.e. 16yrs) required for enrolling for post graduate studies outside India.

Program Fees: Rupees 49, 840/- per annum for Boys and Girls (or as per University rules).

Ph.D. DEGREE PROGRAM IN FOODS AND NUTRITION


The Department of Foods and Nutrition offers a stimulating research environment in which students can pursue a Ph.D. degree from a wide variety of research themes. The doctoral program in Foods and Nutrition offers opportunities for advanced study and original investigations in basic and applied nutrition. The curriculum has been designed with both coursework and thesis research through laboratory and/or field work in a variety of areas relevant to foods and nutrition. Graduates are expected to take up leadership positions in academia, government, industry, and private sector enterprises at national and international levels and to further knowledge in foods and nutrition through research, and promote the application of such knowledge through public health policies and programs.

Financial Assistance: Candidates are advised to apply directly to various national bodies like UGC, ICSSR and ICAR which offer junior research fellowships to doctoral students. The candidates can also apply for the University Research Fellowship awarded by The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda. In addition, the

department has projects from time to time, which can also make financial aid available to those who register for Ph.D. on topics related to the project work.

COURSE-WORK: CREDIT REQUIREMENTS -Ph.D. PROGRAMME IN FOODS AND NUTRITION

- The course-work shall be treated as a prerequisite for the award of Ph.D. degree. All
 research scholars admitted to the Ph.D. Programme shall be required to complete the
 course-work prescribed by the University/Faculty/Department during the initial one
 or two semesters.
- The credits assigned to the Ph.D. course-work shall be a minimum of 08 credits and a maximum of 16 credits.
- Faculty/College/Department level Four [04] credits shall be assigned to one or more courses on Research Methodology which could cover areas such as Quantitative methods, Computer applications, Research ethics and Review of published research in the relevant field, training, field work, etc. Others shall be advanced level courses for preparing the research scholar for Ph.D. degree.

DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN DEVELOPMENT AND FAMILY STUDIES

The Department of Human Development and Family Studies (HDFS) at the Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda was founded in 1949 and is India's pioneering institution in this discipline. It was awarded the status of Center of Advanced Study in Human Development and Family Studies by the University Grants Commission (UGC) in 2005 and is currently in CAS Phase III. Through support from the University Grants Commission (UGC) as well as research funds from other national and international agencies, the department continues to strengthen its academic, research and community outreach programs. Admission to the M.Sc. Degree Programme is based on a minimum of 55% and above at the last qualifying exam at the UG and PG level and subject to clearing the entrance exam and the personal interview. The candidates are short-listed for an interview on the basis of a written test. Fifty percent (50%) weightage is given to candidate's merit at graduate level, 30% is given to performance in a written test and the remaining 20% is based on interview.

The candidates are short-listed for an interview on the basis of a written test. Fifty percent (50%) weightage is given to the candidate's merit at graduate level, 30% is given to performance in a written test and remaining 20% is based on interview.

duly constituted Department Research Committee and upon approval by the Faculty Research Advisory Committee.



Scheme of Examination: Submission of the dissertation is followed by a viva-voce examination.

COURSE-WORK: CREDIT REQUIREMENTS -Ph.D. PROGRAMME IN HUMAN DEVELOPMENT AND FAMILY STUDIES

- The course-work shall be treated as a prerequisite for the award of Ph.D. degree. All research scholars admitted to the Ph.D. Programme shall be required to complete the course-work prescribed by the University/Faculty/Department during the initial one or two semesters
- The credits assigned to the Ph.D. course-work shall be a minimum of 08 credits and a maximum of 16 credits.
- Faculty/College/Department level Four [04] credits shall be assigned to one or more courses on Research Methodology which could cover areas such as Quantitative methods, Computer applications, Research ethics and Review of published research in the relevant field, training, field work, etc. Others shall be advanced level courses for preparing the research scholar for Ph.D. degree.





WOMEN'S STUDIES RESEARCH CENTER (WSRC)

The Women's Studies Research Center (WSRC) at The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda was established in July 1990. WSRC acts as a link between academicians, activists, government functionaries and NGOs so as to mainstream women's and gender issues in the society. The Center undertakes multifaceted activities of research, teaching, training, documentation, and community outreach programs from the standpoint of women's lived experiences with the aim to create critical consciousness about gender in the socio-political, economic and cultural order. The primary objective of WSRC is to open up windows to gender equality and equity, in order to develop, promote and disseminate knowledge about women's and gender issues in the society.

WSRC organizes teaching and training programs to incorporate the gender perspective in mainstream disciplines through courses, seminars, workshops and curriculum development programs across different departments of the University, other universities, research centers, NGOs and allied institutes. Two choice based courses are offered to undergraduate students of the Faculty to instill a gender perspective. WSRC also conducts regular sessions on Gender Sensitivity and Prevention of Sexual Harassment for students across different departments and Faculties of the University.

WSRC has been conferred the Federation of Gujarat Industries (FGI) Award for Excellence in the category of 'Outstanding Achievement in the field of Woman/Girl Child Welfare and Empowerment' in 2009.

VISION

To emerge as a nodal center in the western region of India striving towards women's empowerment and instilling women's and gender perspectives in higher education by establishing linkages with grassroots organizations working with women's issues.

MISSION

To undertake multifaceted activities of research, teaching, training, documentation, and community outreach from the standpoint of women's lived experiences and take a lead in creating critical consciousness about gender in the socio-political, economic and cultural order.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

The disciplines of Women's Studies and Gender studies have flourished over the past few decades. Its roots have spread not just in the scholarly areas but also in the social and economic areas. Gender Studies graduates have found their careers in government and politics. Advocating and helping out cases of people who are unjustly charged, or are persecuted, are helped by Gender Studies/Women's Studies specialists. Persons with Gender Studies or Women's Studies backgrounds would be able to join government or non-government organizations that need inputs in gender related activities and programs, as well as academic and research institutions.

COURSES OFFERED BY WSRC

As part of the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) program, Women's Studies Research Center has introduced two courses at the Undergraduate Level from the academic year 2011-12. 'Women, Society and Development' is being offered to the Second Year students and 'Women, Rights and Law' is being offered to the Third Year students of the Faculty of Family and Community Sciences at present.

GRADE CREDIT SYSTEM OF EVALUATION

For implementation of the choice based credit courses, semester exam including continuous assessment and grading system, the Faculty of Family and Community Sciences has adopted the norms and made necessary modifications for the undergraduate programme.

From the academic year 2012-13 onwards, the student's academic performance in each course offered during a semester is evaluated on the scale as shown below.

PATTERN OF ASSESSMENT:

- A student's academic performance in a particular course is evaluated through a Mid-Semester Examination having Internal Assessment (IA) at the faculty level and the End-Semester examination i.e. University Examination (UA).
- The weightage of mid semester examination is 60% and end-semester examination is 40%.
- Passing shall be decided on the combined result of mid-semester and endsemester examination in the respective courses.
- In the event of a student remaining absent at mid semester examination (Internal Assessment) the candidate can be given only one additional chance of internal assessment (i.e. a re-test) where complete syllabus of the course is mandatory to be covered for evaluation.
- If a candidate fails to appear in the additional examination (re-test), his/her performance shall be nullified for all consideration for that course/paper, as per the University guidelines.
- The examinations of odd semester(s) and even semester(s) will take place simultaneously. The examinations of odd semesters (I, III, IV) shall, however, be prior to respective even semesters (i.e. II, IV, and VI), for facilitating students to complete their programme.'

UPWARD MOVEMENT (PROMOTION TO HIGHER SEMESTER)

- A candidate, who has undergone a regular course of study in Semester-I, shall be eligible for upward movement/promotion to Semester-II.
- A candidate, who has undergone a regular course of study in Semester-II, shall be eligible for upward movement/promotion to Semester-III, provided that the candidate has earned at least 35% credits of Semester-I and Semester-II taken together.
- A candidate, who has undergone a regular course of study in Semester-III, shall be eligible for upward movement/promotion to Semester-IV.
- A candidate, who has undergone a regular course of study in Semester-IV, shall be eligible for upward movement/promotion to Semester-V, provided that the candidate has "Successfully Completed (SC)" all the Courses/Papers/Subjects of Semester-I and Semester-II and also earned at least 35% credits of Semester-III and Semester-IV taken together.
- A candidate, who has undergone a regular course of study in Semester-V, shall be eligible for upward movement/promotion to Semester-VI.
- Similar modus operandi shall be applied for those Programmes having more semesters of study.

However, candidates shall be eligible for the award of Degree/Diploma, on successful completion of all the Courses/Papers/Subjects of the respective Programme of study.

TIME FOR COMPLETION OF PROGRAMME

A candidate shall deem to remain a student only as per following criteria:

After expiry of the maximum period as stipulated, the candidate shall cease to be a student of the programme. In extraordinary circumstances, the Vice-Chancellor may constitute the committee for scrutinizing the cases of candidate(s) who have successfully completed at least 60% of courses / papers. On the recommendation of a committee, the Vice-Chancellor may accord eligibility to such candidate(s) by ONE YEAR and permit a candidate for TWO ADDITIONAL CONSECUTIVE CHANCES for appearing in the examination in order to be eligible for the award of degree / diploma.

Description of Declaration of Result:

The status of the students with respect to current semester as well as consolidated performance of previous semester(s) shall be represented in the Statement of Grade (SoG) as "COMPLETE" or "INCOMPLETE", as applicable.

EVEN Semesters: "COMPLETE, INCOMPLETE, ABSENT"

INSPECTION OF ANSWER BOOKS

In order to have transparency and openness, the answer books shall be placed for "Inspection" centrally at the University Assessment only. The candidate desiring to inspect his/her own answer book(s) for one or all course(s) / paper(s) shall have to apply to Examination Section along with the payment of the required fees. "Inspection of Answer books" shall be carried out in presence of Dean of the Faculty and the Chairman of the concerned course(s) / paper(s) along with the team of examiners, if required. The completed form along with required fees per course/paper should be submitted within Seven (07) working days after the date of declaration of result of the concerned examination by the University.

SCHOLARSHIPS



1. Kelwani Trust Fund Scholarship

Awarded every semester based on previous semester academic record. Two Scholarships of rupees 50.00 each per semester are awarded in each of the academic years of the three year B.Sc. (F.C.Sc.), programme. If more students than one are placed at the first and second ranks the scholarship amount is shared amongst such students.

2. Smt. Manigauri Biharilal Kantawala Memorial Scholarship

Smt. Manipuri Biharilal Kantawala Memorial Scholarship is awarded to a student specializing in Home Management who passes the B.Sc. (F.C.Sc.),

Degree examination of the Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda at the first attempt securing the highest-grade point and pursuing further studies leading to Master's Degree specializing in Home Management in the Faculty of Family and Community Sciences.

3. Prof. (Dr.) Arvinda Chandra Scholarship

Prof. (Dr.) Arvinda Chandra Merit Scholarships will be awarded to two regular students of the third year B.Sc. (F.C.Sc.),in the Department of Extension and Communication, Faculty of Family and Community Sciences, The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda. The scholarship will be given to the first and second ranking students, found on the basis of their AGP, at least 'B' grade in the second year of the Department.

4. Prof. Justina A. Singh Memorial Scholarship

Prof. Justina A. Singh Memorial scholarship will be awarded to a regular candidate securing the highest grade point at the B.Sc. (F.C.Sc.) Examination held by The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda in March/April specializing in Clothing and Textile in the first attempt with minimum A grade.

5. Eklavya Scholarship in Excellence

Instituted by the Eklavya Education Foundation, Ahmedabad it is awarded to B.Sc. (F.C.Sc.), and P.G. ECCE students of the Department of HDFS excelling in academics.

6. Prof. Ms. P.S. Chari Merit Scholarship

Prof. Ms. P.S. Chari Merit Scholarship is awarded to a student admitted to M.Sc. (F.C.Sc) degree programme in Faculty of Family and Community Sciences, the Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda, on successful completion of B.Sc. (F.C.Sc) Degree Examination in March/April of any recognized university of India with specialization in Extension and Communication scoring the highest marks/grade point from amongst such students, obtaining a minimum 'B' grade at the first attempt at the B.Sc. (F.C.Sc) Degree Examination.

7. Pramila Phatak PostGraduate Research Scholarship

This scholarship was instituted in 1975 in honor of Dr. Pramila Phatak, who retired from service after many fruitful years of work. Her contributions in the area of infant assessment have put the Department on the international map. The Pramila Phatak Scholarship is awarded once a year to a senior master's (Sr. M.Sc.) student who has demonstrated competence in research.

8. Prince Dhairyashilrao Sayajirao Gaekwad Scholarship

Prince Dhairyasshilrao Sayajirao Gaekwad Scholarship is awarded to a poor and deserving student in the second year of Master's Degree programme in Human Development and Family Studies (HDFS) to cover tuition fees. Students who have secured a minimum 'B' grade at the first year of Master's Degree Programme and whose parents' annual income does not exceed rupees 10, 000 are eligible to apply for the award of this scholarship.

9. Smt. Roma Mehta Ph. D Scholarship

Smt. Roma Mehta Ph.D. Scholarship is awarded to the student pursuing Ph.D. in Extension and Communication for financial assistance.

FREESHIPS

The number of students awarded free-ships in the Faculty of Family and Community Sciences is fixed at 15 percent of the total number of students.

Free-ships are awarded to students with weak economic backgrounds. Students' desirous of securing free-ships should apply within the specified time on prescribed application form available at the Office of Faculty of Family and Community Sciences. Income certificate should accompany such an application.

The students would be selected for the award of free-ship after subjecting the applicants to an interview conducted by the committee appointed by the Dean. The selected candidates are required to maintain a certain minimum performance in academics every semester for continuation of free-ships in subsequent semesters.

1. Free-ships for Economically Backward Class

Those students who are from EBC category (as per note) will be exempted from giving the development charges. (The income limits of rupees 25, 000/-per year be considered as EBC category and a certificate to the effect is produced by the student duly obtained from mamlatdar at the time of paying fees. Ref. No. A/225 dtd.13.5.1999)

For the purposes of this award, income shall mean the sum total of the income from whatever source including share in joint family income and independent income of the students and their parents. The income specified shall be the income during the financial year preceding the year in which free-ship is sought.

Application for the award of this free-ship shall be made in duplicate every year in the prescribed form available at Vakil Printing Press along with income certificate duly endorsed by a Gazetted Officer or Sarpanch.

2. Free-ships/Scholarships for Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribes

Application for free-ships/scholarship shall be submitted to the Director, Social Welfare, Gujarat State, Ahmedabad, who awards these according to merit and income. Students belonging to SC/ST groups are awarded freeships, cost of books, examination fees and room rent concessions by the Social Welfare Officer of the District.

3. War Concession Free-ships

The Government of Gujarat awards war concession free-ship to students whose parents are in the defense and who have laid down their lives for the country in the war, on production of a certificate to this effect from proper authorities.

4. Poor Student's Aid Fund

Financial assistance from Student's Aid Funds is extended to deserving students on the basis of their need and merit to cover expenses on tuition fees, examination fees and/or purchase of books and/or equipment on the recommendation of the authorities in the Faculty of Family and Community Sciences.

The students desirous of availing of this assistance should apply in the prescribed proforma available at the office of Faculty of Family and Community Sciences and submit the same duly filled in to the office in time.

GOLD MEDALS

1. Smt. Itchhagauri Naik Gold Medal

This is awarded to a student earning the highest quality point with a minimum 'A' grade in class performance and the University Examination as per the guidelines worked out by the committee constituted by the Dean, Faculty of Family and Community Sciences.

2. The Vice Chancellor's Gold Medal

The Vice Chancellor's Gold Medal is awarded to the candidate securing the highest percentage of marks at the B.Sc. (F.C.Sc.) Degree Examination held by The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda provided the candidate secures a minimum first class. This is awarded to students of different faculties by rotation.

3. Smt. Jasumatiben Nagrecha Gold Medal

Smt. Jasumatiben Nagrecha Gold Medal will be awarded to a student passing B.Sc. (F.C.Sc) Final Degree examination held by The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda in March/April with specialization in Extension and Communication obtaining highest quality point considering the last 4 semesters in the category of 'A' grade at the first attempt.

4. Smt. Parvatiben Patel Gold Medal

Smt. Parvatiben Patel Gold Medal to be awarded from among all the M.Sc. (F.C.Sc) Students belonging to all the specializations, to the student who has passed M.Sc. (F.C.Sc) Degree examination in two years during regular academic year obtaining highest quality points considering the courses of all the four semesters, obtaining minimum 'A' grade at the first attempt.

In case of a tie between two or more students for securing equal aggregate points as per above rule the medal should be awarded to a student who has secured the highest grade in the M.Sc. (F.C.Sc) Final examination.

5. The Chancellor's Gold Medal

The Chancellor's Gold Medal is awarded to the candidate securing the highest percentage of marks at the M.Sc. (F.C.Sc) Degree examination held by The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda provided the candidate secures a minimum first class. This is awarded to students belonging to different faculties by rotation.

6. Priya Modern Food Products, Baroda Gold Medal

Priya Modern Food Products, Baroda Gold Medal is to be awarded to a student who has passed M.Sc.(F.C.Sc.) Final Year in Foods and Nutrition with specialization in either Dietetics or Public Health Nutrition with First rank in the Degree Examination held by The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda in March/April every year. This medal is awarded at the annual convocation from 1998 onwards.

7. Dr. Leela Shah Memorial Gold Medal

Dr. Leela Shah Memorial Gold Medal is awarded to candidate specializing in 'Extension and Communication' passing the M.Sc. (F.C.Sc) Degree Examination held by The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda in March/April securing the highest-grade point at the first attempt with a minimum 'A' grade.

8. Smt. ChandanbenDahyabhai Inamdar Gold Medal

Smt. ChandanbenDahyabhai Inamdar Gold Medal is given to the regular student who has passed the B.Sc. (F.C.Sc) Final Degree examination with highest grade point in first attempt.

9. The C. Gopalan – Srikantia – Gold Medal

The C. Gopalan – Srikantia – Gold Medal is to be awarded to a regular post-graduate student at the Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda. The award will be for an outstanding post-graduate thesis/ dissertation submitted in that academic year for a master's degree in the area of 'Foods and Nutrition' with specialization in Dietetics or Public Health Nutrition or any other specialized area of Bio-Sciences e.g. Biochemistry, Biotechnology, Microbiology and Physiology for the dissertations/ thesis related to Foods and Nutrition.

10. The Shantaben Gajanan Bhatt Gold Medal

This Gold Medal is awarded to an under graduate student who obtains first rank across all the semesters at the undergraduate level, B.Sc. (F.C.Sc.), in the Department of Human Development and Family Studies, Faculty of Family and Community Sciences in the examination held in March/April.

11. Smt. KamalabenJivanlal Parikh Gold Medal

Smt. KamalabenJivanlal Parikh Gold Medal is to be awarded to the candidate who has passed M.Sc. (F.C.Sc.) Examination held by the University of Baroda in March/April at First attempt with specialization in Home Management obtaining the highest quality point with minimum 'A' grade.

12. Prof. Sunanda Madhukar Phadke Gold Medal

Prof. Sunanda Madhukar Phadke Gold Medal is to be awarded to the candidate who has passed securing the highest aggregate grade at the B.Sc. (F.C. Sc). Degree examination held by The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda in March/April with specialization in Clothing and Textile/Fashion Designing.

13. Mrs. Usha Cheema Gold Medal

Mrs. Usha Cheema Gold Medal is to be awarded to the candidate who has passed B.Sc.(.F.C.Sc) with specialization in Clothing and Textiles held by The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda in March/April in first attempt with no subject repeat in any subject and obtaining the highest cumulative grade point average (CGPA) with minimum A Grade.

14. Shri. Hirak Navalawala Trust Gold Medal

Shri. Hirak Navalawala Trust Gold Medal is to be awarded to the candidate who has passed M.Sc.(F.C.Sc.)Examination with specialization in Clothing and Textiles held by The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda in March/April in first attempt with no subject repeat in any subject and

obtaining the highest cumulative grade point average (CGPA) with minimum A Grade.

15. Prof. Veena Gandotra Gold Medal

Prof. Veena Gandotra Gold Medal is to be awarded to the candidate who has passed B.Sc. (F.C.Sc.) Examination with Home Management major passing with minimum 'A' grade obtaining highest aggregate grade point in III, IV, V & VI semesters.

16. Late Smt. Jerbanu Nadirsaw Katpita Memorial Gold Medal

The Gold Medal is awarded at the Annual Convocation to be given to the candidate who has passed Bachelor of Faculty of Family and Community Sciences (B.F.C.Sc.) Examination standing First in order to Merit. In case of a tie between two or more students for securing equal highest number of marks as per rule no.6 above, the amount of the Gold Medal shall be provided and distributed equally amongst all the students. (Public Health Nutrition) Degree Examination held by The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda securing the highest cumulative grade point average with a minimum 'A' grade. In case of a tie between two or more students for securing the equal highest number of marks as per the rules

above the amount of the Gold Medal shall be provided and distributed equally amongst all the students.

20. Swati Elavia Gold Medal

The Gold Medal is awarded at the Annual Convocation to the candidate who has passed M.Sc. (Dietetics) Degree Examination held by The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda securing the highest cumulative grade point average with a minimum 'A' grade. In case of a tie between two or more students for securing equal highest number of marks as per the rules above the amount of the Gold Medal shall be provided and distributed equally amongst all the students.

21. Prof. Jayaprabha Patel Gold Medal

The Gold Medal is awarded at the Annual Convocation to the candidate who has passed B.Sc. Honours in Department of Foods and Nutrition (B.Sc. FN (Hons.) HPP) Degree Examination held by The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda securing the highest cumulative grade point average with a minimum 'A' grade. In case of a tie between two or more students for securing the equal highest number of marks as per the rules above the amount of the Gold Medal shall be provided and distributed equally amongst all the students.

22. Vinodkant A. Sanghani Gold Medal

The Gold Medal is awarded at the Annual Convocation to the candidate who has passed B.Sc. (Dietetics) Degree Examination held by The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda securing the highest cumulative grade point average with a minimum 'A' grade. In case of a tie between two or more students for securing equal highest number of marks as per the rules above the amount of the Gold Medal shall be provided and distributed equally amongst all the students.

23. Tanay Janak Patel Gold Medal

The Gold Medal is awarded at the Annual Convocation to the candidate who has passed B.Sc. (Public Health Nutrition) Degree Examination held by The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda securing the highest cumulative grade point average with a minimum 'A' grade. In case of a tie between two or more students for securing the equal highest number of marks as per the rules above the amount of the Gold Medal shall be provided and distributed equally amongst all the students.

AWARDS / PRIZES



1. Smt. Ansuya Krishnamurthy Community Outreach Award

This award is given to a master's student who excels in fieldwork. It is named after Smt. Ansuya Krishnamurthy, who was associated as a preschool teacher with Chetan Balwadi, the laboratory nursery school of the Department, from its inception. It was initiated in 1995 by Prof. Parul Dave, an alumni achievement award. It is given to regular students of M.Sc. (F.C.Sc.) in Human Development and Family Studies at the end of the IVth semester. The student must have obtained a minimum of overall 'B' grade with minimum of 'A' grade in Field Work related courses.

2. The Alumni Achievement Award

In the nomination and selection of candidates for the award, the spirit in which the award was instituted is always kept in mind.

3. Nalanda Awards

These awards are given out by Nalanda International School for meritorious performance of students of B.Sc. (F.C.Sc.) and P.G. ECCE of the Department of Human Development Family Studies, in academics and fieldwork.

4. Prof. Amita Verma Prize

Prof. Amita Varma Prize is given to Postgraduate Diploma students of ECCE who secure first position. This award was initiated in 1998-99 by Ms. Nita Patel, herself an alumni achievement awardees, in honor of Prof. Amita Verma

in recognition of her invaluable contribution to the genesis and growth of the Department.

5. Shri. Harilal Muljibhai Trivedi Prize

This prize is awarded to a P.G. ECCE student who scores highest in fieldwork, the prize was initiated in 1998-99 by Ms. Rajeshwari Trivedi, an alumni achievement award.

6. Rajbala Sharma Memorial Prize in Child Development

This prize was instituted by the Department in memory of late Ms. Rajbala Sharma, a master's student in Child Development, who endeared herself to the teachers and peers as a genuine seeker of knowledge. Her life was cut short in June 1979 following a major heart surgery. It is awarded to regular student of the Master's degree programme in Human Development and Family Studies (HDFS).

7. Shri, Jashvantlal Trikamlal Bumia Prize

Shri. Jashvantlal Trikamlal Bumia Prize is instituted in memory of Shri Jashvantlal Trikamlal Bumia and is to be awarded to the candidate specializing in Foods and Nutrition with any specialization, namely Public Health Nutrition/Dietetics/ Food Science & Quality Control securing the highest aggregate grade at B.Sc. (F.C.Sc.) (Honors) Degree Examination.

8. Prof. Kalpana Parlikar Prize

Prof. Kalpana Parlikar Prize is awarded every year to a top-ranking student with a minimum of 'B' grade in the Post Graduate Diploma in Development Management offered by the Department of Extension and Communication.

9. Ms. Savitri Pandit Prize

Ms. Savitri Pandit Prize in cash is to be awarded to a regular student specializing in Clothing & Textiles passing M.Sc. (F.C.Sc.) degree examination held by the Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda in March/April securing the highest grade point at the first attempt with a minimum 'A' grade.

10. Smt. Maniben Ranchhodlal Shah Prize

Smt. Maniben Ranchhodlal Shah Prize in cash to be awarded to a student who has passed M.Sc.(F.C.Sc.) Degree in Foods and Nutrition with specialization in either Dietetics or Public Health Nutrition, securing the highest grade point at the first attempt with a minimum 'A' grade in the Degree Examination held by The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda in March/April every year. The candidate should be recommended by the Head, Foods and Nutrition Department and Dean, Faculty of Family and Community Sciences, The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda.

11. Outstanding Alumni Achievement award by MSUFNAA

Foods and Nutrition Alumni Association acknowledges the contribution of eminent alumni in the field of Foods and Nutrition and confers an outstanding alumni achievement award to them. Choosing the awardee is in line with the spirits and criteria set up by the association.

12. Dr Mrunalini Devi Puar Memorial Oration Award by MSUFNAA

Dr Mrunalini Devi Puar was an alumnus of the Department of Foods and Nutrition. She had initiated the Oration series in 1998. Foods and Nutrition Alumni Association invites an eminent speaker from the field of Foods and Nutrition for delivering the oration.

13. Outstanding Student award (PG level) by MSUFNAA

Foods and Nutrition Alumni Association (FNAA) confers an outstanding student award to a M. Sc. student who has completed three semesters of study at the department. Nominations are invited from the students. Following the criteria as set up by the association, the final name is decided.

14. Outstanding Student award (UG level) by MSUFNAA

Foods and Nutrition Alumni Association (FNAA) confers an outstanding student award to a B. Sc. student who has completed five semesters of study at the department. Nominations are invited from the students. Following the criteria as set up by the association, the final name is decided.

STUDENTS SUPPORT SYSTEM


Teacher Supervisor:

SMT. HANSA MEHTA LIBRARY

- Smt. Hansa Mehta Library, a state of art Library is the first in the state to provide *Wi-Fi* facility to its clientele. Library is under surveillance through a closed circuit television with the help of 24 cameras located strategically around various functional areas.
- It has a rich collection of prescribed textbooks and bound journals of more than one lakh, out of which some are as old as Nineteenth Century available till date.
- The Library has a digital collection of rare books in house to create an Institutional Repository to serve the readers globally.
- It has a single largest Reading Room of 10,600 sq. ft. which can accommodate about 1100 readers at a time and is open to readers from 8.00 am to 10.00 pm i.e. 14 hours a day throughout the year except National holidays.
- All reading areas are covered with fully central AC facility. It is situated in the whole North Side of the building, in order to have a continuous natural light throughout the year.
- The books are stacked on the two floors. These Stack Rooms have the same dimensions as the Reading Room with an additional sitting capacity of 500 plus readers
- To serve the visually challenged and people with low vision, Zoomex Instant Text Reader has been procured.

UNIVERSITY HEALTH CENTRE

- The University Health Centre provides consultation, investigations, specialists' services, treatment facilities for all common ailments, minor surgical treatment and counseling services to the staff, their dependents and students of The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda.
- Facilities for admission under observation, administration of intravenous fluids, immunization services and supportive laboratories are also available.

MARG COUNSELLING CENTRE AT THE UNIVERSITY HEALTH CENTRE

- Counselling, Psychotherapy, Psychiatric treatment and Psychological testing are offered by MARG Counselling Centre functioning at the University Health Centre on a voluntary basis.
- It provides treatment in cases of mental health problems, stress and substance abuse to the University staff, their children and family members, as well as youths, school children and the general public of Vadodara.

HALLS OF RESIDENCE FOR BOYS AND GIRLS

- The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda has one of the largest hostel campuses in the Western India.
- 12 Boys Hostel and 4 Girls Hostel and a separate Hostel for SC/ST are spread over the area of approximately 100 acres accommodating approximately 3800 students.

UNION PAVILION GROUND

• The Union Pavilion Ground has facilities like swimming pool, athletic track, badminton court, basketball court, tennis court, volleyball court, kho-kho court, handball court, hockey field, cricket field, football field, kabaddi court, indoor table tennis hall and multi gym maintained by the Department of Physical Education.

UNIVERSITY STUDENT'S FACILITATION CENTRE

The Student's Facilitation Centre serves as a help desk in The Maharaja Sayajirao University Main office to provide a one-point interface between students and university administration for information requirements, transactions related to examination and results, various issues of documents, payments for various services and purchase of publications. A helpline with videophone and well-informed staff members at the reception are the key aspects of the centre.

THE CENTRE FOR LIFELONG LEARNING AND EXTENSION

The Centre for Lifelong Learning and Extension is active in the field of Continuing Education in and around Vadodara since the last four decades. The center was established to cater the felt needs of the society with the resources available in the University and from the community at large. The Centre offers short-term courses ranging from fifteen days to three months, and long-term courses ranging from six months to one year.

UNIVERSITY EMPLOYMENT INFORMATION AND GUIDANCE BUREAU

This Bureau has been run by the Employment and Training Department (Labor and Employment) Government of Gujarat since 1964. It deals with the work of Vocational Guidance activities as well placement services. All master degree holders, engineering graduate and professional degree holders, and unemployed candidates are registered and the placement services are provided to them.

NATIONAL CADET CORPS (NCC)

NCC is one of the biggest youth forums, which brings the vibrant students together and guides them in proper direction so that they can play a constructive role in the development of the country. These students have enormous opportunities to show their talent and skills. Besides Military Training they have an opportunity for adventurous activities, which gives them a wide horizon and keeps them morally and mentally fit so that they become well disciplined members of the society.

The National Service Scheme is aimed at personality development of students through community services. NSS is a centrally managed programme enrolling student volunteers from different faculties of the University. The Maharaja Sayajirao University Union is a statutory corporate body of the students and teachers to promote academics, social interaction, sports and cultural interests amongst the students. It works towards the development of student facilities.

UNIVERSITY COMPUTER CENTRE

The Maharaja Sayajirao University-Computer Center was established to facilitate not only the research students and teachers for their research data processing but also different industries like Oil and Natural Gas Corporation (ONGC), Gujarat Electricity Board (GEB), Indian Petrochemical Corporation Limited (IPCL) etc. The Computer Center assists in computerization of the University applications like examination result processing system, payroll system, network facilities, internet connectivity, deployment of web-based services and training of manpower and as facilitator for international academic interactions.

PROF. C. C. MEHTA AUDITORIUM

The C. C. Mehta Auditorium has been effectively used by the University and the other Institutions for academic, cultural, social or the business purposes since its establishment.

UNIVERSITY GUEST HOUSE

The University Guest House is located in the heart of the University Campus, just besides the Vice Chancellor's Bungalow. It provides comfortable facilities for staying on the campus. It has 30 rooms with different types of comforts.

WOMEN'S GRIEVANCE AND COUNSELING CELL

Cell is at university as well as faculty level. They look after the safety and security of the girls' students and female employees.

All the registered students and staff can avail the facility of WiFi on campus.
